EVERGLADES HOMES TOUR

One of the buildings on our **Everglades Homes Tour** on **Saturday, March 9,** from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. is the historic Ivey House which is now a Bed & Breakfast.

The original lodge was built as a recreation hall for Tamiami Trail workers in DuPont, across the river. It was moved to its present site in 1926 and converted into a boarding house. After the Trail was completed, the Ivey family operated it.

Other buildings on the tour include City Hall (the original Collier County Courthouse), First Baptist Church, the famous Rod & Gun Lodge, and a number of private homes whose owners have graciously agreed to open to the public for the afternoon.

The souvenir ticket booklet costs \$20 per person. You can buy one in advance on our website using a credit/debit card or fill in the form to send with a check.
