

TAMIAMI TRAIL 80TH BIRTHDAY

Plans are underway for a huge celebration in April to commemorate the opening of the Trail (US-41) through Lee, Collier, and Dade counties in 1928. The Tamiami-80 Committee are hoping to recreate that event with a cavalcade of antique cars, alligator wresting, Indian dancing, a parade and a host of dignitaries speaking. This will all take place on Saturday, April 26, exactly 80 years after the original ceremony.

On the next day, Sunday, April 27, the Museum of the Everglades will have its birthday party with the traditional hotdogs, cake, and story-telling about past times. The old Collier Laundry building was restored, thanks to the efforts of local residents, and converted into a County museum 10 years ago. Its official opening on April 26, 1998, was deliberately scheduled to coincide with the Trail anniversary.

The Tamiami-80 Committee usually meets on the first Monday of each month at 10:00 a.m. in the Everglades Community Church annex but the next meeting will be on Wednesday, January 23. Everyone is welcome.

BARRON COLLIER

This amazing man was so influential in our local history that we forget he was an outstanding figure in other spheres. Barron Gift Collier is credited with suggesting the yellow stripe down the center of roads to control traffic and with helping to form Interpol, the international police agency. His enterprises included streetcar advertising and a franchise for newspaper outlets in the New York subway system. In Florida he had hotels, farms, a shipping line, a bus line, a chain of general merchandise stores and almost 1 million acres of land which he hoped to develop.

As most people know, it was Collier who organized the construction of the Tamiami Trail through uncharted swamp in the Glades. But, his crews also built what is now SR-29 to Immokalee and CR-92 to Marco Island and prepared the track for the Atlantic Coast Line railroad which ran from Everglades City to Immokalee and then onwards to points north.
