

MSD Festival

The Museum of the Everglades is holding its Fifth Annual Marjory Stoneman Douglas Festival on February 23-26 with a number of talks, walks, and other activities. The jamboree commemorates one of the most revered Everglades conservationist who lived until she was 108 years old and saw many changes in southern Florida.

She came here in 1915 to work with her father, Frank Stoneman, who was editor of what is now the Miami Herald. Marjory became a journalist and short-story author before she was asked to write Everglades; River of Grass in 1947. The book became a best-seller and influenced the way we think about the Glades (a copy of the original paperback is in our Historical Library). She also wrote her memoirs, Voice of the River, which describes her fascinating life. For more info, phone the Museum at 695-0008.

FAREWELL

We are sorry to announce that our Vice-President Carol Moseman passed away on October 28 after a brief bout with cancer. She had spent hours researching the history of City Hall and the life of its architect William O. Sparklin for our National Register application. When we were raising funds to Save City Hall, Carol used her quilting skills to make potholders and pillows. She was always ready to lend a hand at our activities and is missed.

One of our most senior members, Lucy House Storter, passed away on December 20. She was born in 1920 on Chokoloskee into a pioneering family (her grandfather was G. C. McKinney) and married into another one. Husband Lem Storter, who died in 2005, was the son of Rob Storter (creator of Crackers in the Glade).

Historical Recipe

Marci Townley Hallock, who lives in Oregon and may be the most remote of our members, sent in this recipe which she inherited from her grandfather Cyril Santini. The family settled in Chokoloskee in the 1870s, originally coming from Corsica. They left in the late 1890s, selling out to Ted Smallwood, and went to Key Largo (where they were later famous for "Flipper" the dolphin) and Estero Island (now called Ft. Myers Beach).

CLAM FRITTERS by Cyril Santini

1-1/2 doz clams	1-1/2 cups flour
1 t. pepper	3/4 cup clam liquor
1/2 cup milk	3 eggs, beaten
1 T melted butter or cooking fat	

Separate clams from liquor (save both). Split the clams, remove dark stomach contents. Rinse in cold water. Mince clams as fine as possible. Sift in flour, salt (to taste), and pepper. Add clam liquor, milk and eggs. Stir until smooth. Add butter and minced clams. Sauté in cast iron skillet in thin cakes or drop Tbsp. in hot fat (380 degrees) and cook until golden brown.
