Before the ceremony, visitors were taken on a tour of City Hall, including a visit to our new office which is now furnished, thanks to a gift of \$1000 for that purpose.

#### NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES

We have almost completed the application to have City Hall listed but have found that we know very little about the architect, **William O. Sparklin**, who also designed the old Bank and Laundry buildings in Everglades City.

We did discover that he moved from Baltimore to Jacksonville around 1922 and that he also worked in St. Petersburg and Fort Myers, where he designed the Alva and Tice schools (both on National Register). He formed Sparklin-Gift Construction Company with Barron Gift Collier while he was here.

### HISTORICAL LIBRARY

In the past few months, donors have contributed enough books to almost fill one shelf in the library. There are also several sets of historical magazines (eg, *Tequesta, South Florida History*) in the book case, plus material about preservation from the National Trust.

A "gem" among the books is "From Ticks to Politics", a self-published typescript of memoirs by Inez Magill who was assistant County Clerk under Ed Scott in Everglades City during the 1950s. She describes life in the town where she first had an apartment in the old jail building and then shared a Collier house with several school teachers. One could almost imagine her working at City Hall in the room that we now use as an office and library!

The new black metal, lockable filing cabinets on the back wall contain our organizational documents and archives, including pictures of "lost buildings" (structures that have been demolished).

One drawer has a collection of clippings from the *Everglades Echo* from 1983 until 2003. Each article (there are over 1000 of them) has been categorized by subject in a data base and an index has been printed out for easy searching.

D. G. Copeland was an avid historian and his notes, entitled "Data Relative to Florida", were compiled and a typed copy was presented to the State Library in 1947. Some of the pages about early pioneers in the area have been photocopied and indexed. A number of familiar family names are mentioned.

The library will only be open when one of our members is there to supervise access to the archives. Until we have a roster of volunteers, readers and donors can phone 695-2905 or 695-2397 to make an appointment.
