

"Saving Old Buildings"

About 40 people gathered at the Seafood Depot on Tuesday, March 3, to hear a talk by Chris Busk, the landscape architect from Bonita Springs who was responsible for moving the Haldeman House from Naples so that it could be renovated.

The house, seen above in 1900, was built in 1876 near Naples Pier and sat in a large lot which was being redeveloped. No one wanted the building and Busk finally had to cut it into three pieces before trucking it up US-41 to Bonita Springs. This was his third project, having previously rebuilt the Nutting and William Packard houses. Because people live differently now, he has installed air-conditioning and rearranged the rooms, often adding more space and even lifting the roof.

Busk himself moved from his hometown of West Palm Beach to the Gulf Coast in 1979. He settled in Bonita Springs because there was a wealth of old buildings there, the town having been by-passed by US-41. For more about him and his work, see www.cbusk.com.
