Pioneering Medicine in the Marco Wilderness

Imagine Marco Island in the early 1900s - wilderness! Not much was there except the W.T. Collier's trading post, a few scattered houses.

This is what Drs. Mary and Lewis Olds found when they arrived. But, they were both medical experts and could help their neighbors. There were no roads then so the nearest doctor was in Fort Myers or Key West, a tortuous trip by sail boat for a sick person. Times were tough and the Olds family farmed like everyone else on the Island.

Local historian Betsy Perdichizzi has unearthed the family letters and compiled them into a fascinating real history book *Into the Florida Wilderness; A Journey with Drs. Mary and Lewis Olds, Pioneer Life and Medicine in Southwest Florida*.

Betsy will present unseen photos and read excerpts during her talk on **Friday**, **November 30**, at 5:30 p.m. in the Everglades Community Church. This is our first event of the winter season. It is free and open to the public. For info, call 695-2905.
