EXCITING NEWS!

The owner of the old Bank of Everglades has generously donated the Building to us!

Now we face the daunting task of renovating it – fixing the foundation, repairing the roof, replacing windows & doors, installing an elevator and air conditioning, remodeling the interior – the task is mammoth!

We have started with a big clearing out and have filled three large dumpsters but we saved the good items for the Rummage Event on **Saturday**, **April 17** (see next page).

That's just the beginning. We have already received a comprehensive structural analysis of the building to identify the areas of concern.

The next steps include assembling the team to help guide the project forward and formulating a budget. Then, we will apply for grants and plan fundraising.

Our immediate concern is to weatherproof the roof and windows before rainy season.

Our future vision is to transform the downstairs into a permanent Visitor Center & Trail Town Headquarters with space for community events like exhibits, talks, and movies. The rooms upstairs will provide affordable rentable space for artists and small businesses.

The issue includes an article entitled "Pioneer Women of Dade County" by Mary Barr Monroe, an early settler in Coconut Grove and vocal opponent against plume hunting.

MUSEUM UPDATE

A new exhibit about Deep Lake is on show in the Pauline Reeves Gallery at the front of the Museum of the Everglades.

The site, about 15 miles north of Everglades City on SR-29, had a grapefruit farm which was bought by Barron Collier as his first purchase of land in this area. The name "Deep Lake" derives from the deep sink hole on the property, now part of Big Cypress National Preserve.


